More than 60 students compete in SkillsUSA



Career and technical education students from around the state competed in in April the 2018 Oregon SkillsUSA competition held at Camp Withycombe in Clackamas. The Automotive Service Technology competition was hosted by Portland Community College's Sylvania Campus. This year,

67 automotive students registered to compete.

Vale High School students won 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 5th place, an amazing show of talent from a little city in Malheur County with a population of less than 1,000 people and a high school of just 320 student. The winning students from Vale were Josh Duckworth (1st place), Josh Andersen (2nd place), Beau Belnap (a junior who finished third), and Dan Wenger (5th place).

A cautionary tale about after-hours use of shop



It may seem like a good idea to give your employees the added benefit of using your shop after hours to work on their own projects...but is it?

Recently, a Northwest Automotive Trades Association member reported that two of his

employees were in his shop over the weekend to do a quick engine swap. Unfortunately when the engine was on the stand, one technician was turning the top heavy engine when it suddenly spun, ripping a huge gouge in his arm and damaging several tendons. The good news: He was not alone at the time, so his co-worker quickly drove him to the emergency room for immediate medical attention.

The bad news, however: That technician, the lead technician for the shop and its highest producer, is disabled for two months.

SAIF workers' compensation insurance will not cover this claim because the employee was not working for the company at the time of the incident. The shop owner estimates the loss of revenue from this employee's temporary disability is at least \$100,000. The employee has AFLAC insurance and will receive roughly \$1,000 per month while he is disabled.

NOBODY gained anything from this "added benefit" of after-hours

Abby's Closet is an Oregon-based nonprofit, established to inspire confidence and respect in high school women by providing free formal gowns for prom or other memorable events. For some students, getting a free dress from Abby's Closet is the only way they're

able to attend prom, an important celebration and rite of passage.

At this event, AWA hosted a booth which included dexterity boxeswhere participants assemble components inside a box - without using their vision. The booth also included 3 cylinder heads. The young ladies were given a power tool and taught how to remove and install a spark plug, rocker arm, and camshaft. Many of the young women were reluctant to participate, but with a little encouragement they all completed their tasks with smiles.

"With an audience of 1,200 women, this was the perfect venue to reach young women who are undecided about their future," Margaret Ragan, vice president of AWA, said. "So many NEVER used a power tool, NEVER considered working in a trade, NEVER knew the earning potential of a trade, especially in automotive"
