School wins grant from band's foundation



Clackamas Community College is getting a big boost from a major rock band. CCC is one of 10 recipients of a \$100,000 grant from the Metallica Scholars Initiative, funded by Metallica's All Within My Hands Foundation. The foundation provides direct support to community colleges to enhance career and technical education programs.

Among the items the funds will cover will be half the cost of tools for 12 automotive

and autobody students; welding tools, textbooks and personal protective equipment for 20 students; \$5,000 for a marketing video featuring students in the school's new Industrial Technology Center; and travel costs for two staff members to attend the Workforce Development Institute.

We asked Dave Bradley, chairman of CCC's automotive department, why the school was selected for the grant.

"I could really spin a yarn here about how my band used to open for Metallica back in the early 80s, and we're still real tight, but unfortunately, that's not quite true," Bradley said. "We don't know any of them. We have on staff a wonderful grant writer, Amy Cannata, who discovered the All Within My Hands Foundation about three weeks before the application deadline. She got a few of us together, and compiled a very impressive application."

Two other Northwest community colleges, North Idaho College and Spokane Community College, were among the other nine grant recipients nationwide.

DEQ proposes hike in fees



The Oregon Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) is seeking Environmental Quality Commission Department of approval for several rule changes (such Environmental as removing references to procedures no longer performed) and an increase in the fee for certificates of compliance.

DEQ is proposing a \$25 fee in the Portland inspection area as of July 2019, and a \$15 fee in the Medford inspection area. The proposal calls for additional increases in Medford in 2021 and 2023, bringing the fee by that time to \$25.

Latest "Who Pays" survey under way



Collision repair shops have until January 31 to complete the latest "Who Pays for What?" survey conducted by Mike Anderson (of Collision Advice) and CRASH Network. This national survey Question #3 (one of four conducted throughout the year) focuses on not-included refinish-related, asking shops which a fin items they bill for and how frequently they are paid for them by the eight
