Second 'Education-Industry Roundtable' planned

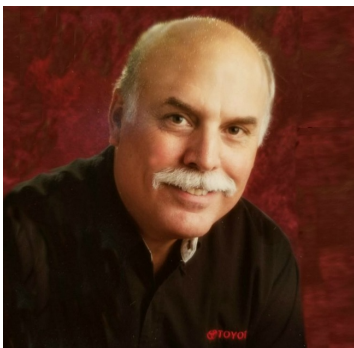


Last year's first-ever "Education Industry Roundtable" was such a great success that attendees have asked for another similar gathering this year.

Memorial gathering planned for Dennis Mattoon



A celebration of life will be held January 19 in Portland for Dennis Mattoon, a high school automotive instructor (and later dean at Mt. Hood Community College), who died December 7 at age 64.

Mattoon knew at an early age he wanted to teach. He spent 32 years as the automotive instructor at Columbia/Reynolds High School in Troutdale, before becoming Dean of Industrial & Automotive Technical College at Mt. Hood Community College for five years. He retired in 2013 after making a difference in the lives of so many students.

Family, friends and colleagues will gather at 5:30 p.m. on Sunday, January 19 at the Oregon Rail Heritage Foundation Museum (where Mattoon was a volunteer docent), 2250 S.W. Water Ave., to share memories.

Programs help connect youth with jobs



If you're looking to fill entry-level positions or are offering internship opportunities in Multnomah or Washington counties, read on.

[Worksystems](#) is a local non-profit that coordinates a regional system to deliver workforce development programs that help people get the skills, training and education they need to go to work or advance in their careers. Worksystems leverages funding from federal, state and local legislation, grants, as well as public and private sponsorships, to support a multitude of programs that successfully deliver a competitive youth and adult workforce system.

Two of its youth programs include "SummerWorks" and "Connect2Careers."

"SummerWorks" is a paid summer internship program that targets youth from diverse backgrounds ages 16-24 who have little or no work history. Youth complete a 10-12 hour "Work Readiness Training" that gets them the key soft skills they need to succeed at work, and then they apply to get matched with paid entry- and mid-level internship opportunities with local participating employers. The opportunity cost to sponsor one intern (180 hours of work) this year is \$3,250, which includes all wages, payroll processing, workers comp, employer of record services, youth job coaching, and other youth support services.

"Connect2Careers" similarly targets diverse youth ages 16-24 who have completed the 10-12 hour "Work Readiness Training." It provides a year-round, centralized portal for youth to search, get matched, and apply for paid direct-hire, entry level jobs with local companies.

There is no cost for employers to list their entry positions through the C2C job portal. Participating employers are committed to the value of the "Work Readiness Training," and are prepared to prioritize these youth in the application process.

Bend High School has instructor job opening



Bend High School in March will post a job opening for next school year for an instructor for its hybrid program that combines automotive technology with metal fabrication. The

Open house at newly-expanded CCC shop



Clackamas Community College is holding an open house on January 31 to show off its newly remodeled and expanded Automotive

Department. Students are now learning in modern facilities with state-of-the-art equipment, similar to what they will find working in the industry.

CCC offers numerous degrees and certificates in collision repair and automotive service technology. The expansion adds 12,600 square feet of shop, storage and classroom space. Within that space are two 25-foot-by-30-foot flex labs and 12 additional technician work stations, bringing the total to 23 work stations.

This expansion doubles the space for the college's high school program, where students from regional high schools come on campus and take classes with CCC instructors.

CCC also has a partnership with the World of Speed Museum in Wilsonville for area high school automotive students. CCC provides the instructors and the curriculum and World of Speed provides the classrooms space and tools.

The remodel and expansion on the CCC Oregon City campus provides students and instructors the space they need for a productive learning environment. Students learn hands-on in a space that mimics real shops. This gives them the experience they need to be fully prepared to enter the workforce.

"CCC now has the room needed to explore opportunities to continue to grow and expand our programs, increasing the number of graduates who are ready to enter the automotive industry," Cynthia Risan, CCC dean of Technology, Applied Science and Public Services, said.

The community is invited to help celebrate the Automotive Department expansion and remodel at a grand opening January 31 at 3:30 p.m. in Barlow Hall. There will be a short program, tours and refreshments. The college is located at 19600 Molalla Ave., Oregon City.

The \$5.7-million project is funded through a bond voters approved in November 2014 to expand opportunities for students and to increase the skilled workforce in the community. This funding was supplemented by \$32 million in match funding from the state.

Mileage reimbursement rate for 2020



Businesses should be aware that the 2020 mileage reimbursement rate will be 57.5 cents per business mile (down from 58 cents in 2019).

Rules being drafted for new corporate tax

Businesses with commercial activity in excess of \$1 million in Oregon must pay a "Corporate Activity Tax" (CAT) on the total



amount a business realizes from commercial activity in Oregon. It applies to all business entities whether inside and outside of Oregon. The tax is \$250 plus 0.57% of gross receipts greater than \$1 million after subtractions.

Drafts of eight administrative rules for the new CAT are now available to the public on the CAT page of the Department of Revenue's

website at www.oregon.gov/dor.

The agency has identified nearly three dozen issues which may need to be addressed with administrative rules. Those issues have been prioritized into three groups.

The first group of rules - those most business taxpayers and tax preparers have said they need to understand first - have been filed with the Secretary of State. The other two groups will follow on February 1, and March 1.

The eight drafts posted on the agency's website this week address:

- Estimated payments.
- Estimated payments for unitary groups.
- Underpayment of or delinquent estimated payments.
- What establishes nexus between a business and Oregon.
- What constitutes a unitary group for the CAT.
- Property brought into Oregon.
- The definition of agent.
- Filing extensions.

The agency previously engaged more than 800 stakeholders in the rulemaking process through a series of public meetings, video conferences and conference calls. Department officials said they will welcome additional feedback on the draft rules. Those with comments can send feedback via [email](#) (please include "comments on draft rules" in the subject line.)

When officially filed with the Secretary of State all of the rules for the CAT will initially be adopted as temporary rules. Temporary rules are only good for 180 days. Starting April 1, the department will begin the process of adopting permanent rules for the CAT. That process involves public comment, giving stakeholders another chance to provide input to the department.
