(There also are only two college level autobody programs in Oregon.) With the skilled labor shortage, this new CTEC program is a much-needed addition.

The instructor is TJ Wilson. TJ came to Oregon from Texas and says, "This is my dream job." He enjoys working with students and loves being involved in body restoration and paint projects.

Students are working on a variety of projects from painting a motorcycle fuel tank to a complete restoration of a donated MG. Along the way someone asked if the students could perform a custom paint job on a golf cart; now they have a steady supply of carts to transform.

"Who Pays" survey finds shops making progress



An upw ard trend in the percentage of shops across the United States regularly being paid to mask as necessary for priming continued this year.

Back in 2015, a "Who Pays for What?" survey conducted by Collision Advice and *CRASH Network* found that less than 1 in 4 (24 percent) shops said they were paid "alw ays" or "most of the time" when

charging the eight largest national insurance companies for the "notincluded" labor required prior to priming to protect the vehicle from overspray.

That grew to 37 percent in the last several years. But the same survey this past January found that 43 percent of the more than 600 shops responding to the question reported regularly being paid for masking



during the priming process. Only about one-third of shops said they have never sought to be paid for that procedure.

Mike Anderson of Collision Advice said the change is a good indication the industry is increasingly aw are of the not-included procedures shops often do without seeking compensation.

Shops can click here to take the latest of the four 2019 "Who Pays for What?" surveys, which focuses on "not-included" body labor operations. It is open through the end of April.

Survey participants receive a report with complete survey findings at no charge, broken dow n by region, insurer and DRP vs. non-DRP. The report also includes analysis and resources to help shops better understand and use the information presented.
