NATA members' SAIF discount will rise to 10%

SAIF on May 1 also stopped accepting applications for its coronavirus worker safety fund, which SAIF is using to distribute \$25 million to businesses to help offset their added costs for workplace safety related to the pandemic.

"While \$25 million is a lot of money, we knew it would not come close to meeting businesses' full needs," Christy Witzke of SAIF said in a statement. "In fact, we've received an enormous response, with requests totaling close to four times the amount available. These requests came from large and small SAIF policyholders all around Oregon, in a broad range of industries. We recognize our policyholders have experienced major impacts from the coronavirus that this fund cannot fully address. Nonetheless, we're pleased to be able to offer some assistance in making Oregon's workplaces safer for employees."

Help with 'social distancing' policies

What is social distancing?

Social distancing is a public health practice that aims to prevent and contain the spread of disease among people by reducing opportunities for person-to-person contact.

Social distancing is beneficial because it helps prevent disease spread by reducing person-to-person contact. It is most effective when combined with other measures such as wearing masks, avoiding crowded places, and staying home when sick.

It is important to note that social distancing is not a substitute for other public health measures such as wearing masks, avoiding crowded places, and staying home when sick.

Document your need for PPP



Our friends at Irvine & Company know that many of you received or will receive Small Business Administration "Payroll Protection Loans," and are offering the following recommendation about it:

As you have seen in recent news, PPP eligibility has been under scrutiny as funding ran short. Due to this additional scrutiny, we are suggesting you **document your need for PPP funds**, and if you have a board of directors, you document in your board minutes the Board's approval of the PPP loan.

Unfortunately, nowhere does the current guidance contain the level of detail necessary to address these issues with any degree of certainty. However, the Treasury has offered the limited additional guidance on PPP funding needs per below.

A PPP recipient has made two important certifications during the application process:

- "Current economic uncertainty makes this loan request necessary to support the ongoing operations of the Applicant."
- "The funds will be used to retain workers and maintain payroll or make mortgage interest payments, lease payments, and utility payments, as specified under the Paycheck Protection Program Rule; I understand that if the funds are knowingly used for unauthorized purposes, the federal government may hold me legally liable, such as for charges of fraud."

Further, the Treasury has provided two FAQs related to eligibility and

their future oversight.

- On April 23 and 28, the Treasury issued FAQ #31 and #37 that specifies, "Borrowers must make this certification in good faith, taking into account their current business activity and their ability to access other sources of liquidity sufficient to support their ongoing operations in a manner that is not significantly detrimental to the business. For example, it is unlikely that a public company with substantial market value and access to capital markets will be able to make the required certification in good faith, and such a company should be prepared to demonstrate to SBA, upon request, the basis for its certification."
- On April 29, the Treasury issued FAQ #39 that specifies that, "To further ensure PPP loans are limited to eligible borrowers in need, the SBA has decided, in consultation with the Department of the Treasury, that it will review all loans in excess of \$2 million, in addition to other loans as appropriate, following the lender's submission of the borrower's loan forgiveness application."

Therefore, our recommendation to all borrowers is to document your rationale for your certifications. We recommend that your documentation include an explanation of:

1. Borrowers current activity;
2. Borrowers access to other sources of liquidity to support its ongoing operations; and,
3. An evaluation of ability to access other sources of liquidity sufficient to support their ongoing operations in a manner that is not significantly detrimental to the business.

Beyond this, if you have concerns, we recommend you engage your legal counsel who can help you evaluate the legitimacy of your certifications and eligibility.
